Notes from the composer:

Of Mercy and Judgment is a setting of Psalm 101:1–4 which addresses tensions between the longing for both moral perfection and the unforced grace of divine presence in relationship with God. The music underscores the psalmist's striving for righteousness, expressed in mounting declarations of fidelity to "the perfect way". Yet these declarations have failed — God has not appeared. Thus the aching cry of the psalmist's heart: "O when wilt thou come unto me?" The music echoes its refrain — "I will sing of mercy and judgment unto thee, O Lord" — with the gathering conviction that both are perfectly reconciled in the heart of God.
