

FOREWORD

Run away to Treble Clef Island, where Super Frog and Mr. E—the well-known and beloved Freddie the Frog® and Eli the Elephant—save the Red Brass Army Ants, Blue Beetle Bugs, and Damsselfies by resetting the Mighty Meter Gnome, who sets the pace of their working feet. Before the superhero friends arrive, the rest of our friends learn about tempo, beat, and various musical styles as they sing to the pace of the Mighty Meter Gnome’s tick-tock beat. As written, there are 23 speaking parts in *Freddie the Frog® and the Mighty Meter Gnome*, along with a chorus of Red Brass Army Ants that can number as many as needed. Of course, the script may be adapted for your needs, to feature four speaking Ants instead of 12, for example. The Rehearsal Schedule outlined on page 65 also includes suggestions for how to adapt the musical if you have limited preparation time.

The optional Orff accompaniments allow you to include even more students in the performance, and provide yet another performance option. These include:

- There are two accompaniment versions on the included CD. Both feature a high-energy instrumental ensemble, but Version 1 also includes the metronome sound effects. If using this option, the students will need to pace their dialogue to match the CD, so you’ll want to start rehearsing it this way as soon as possible. Several of the longer scenes are accompanied by multiple tracks, which are identified on the dialogue pages and in the CD track listing on pages 4–5.
- Version 2 includes only accompaniment recordings of the songs and the various instrumental interludes that played throughout. If using this version, a student (or multiple students—it’s challenging to play a steady beat for that long!) will need to play the metronome part on a wood block or xylophone. The stage directions on the dialogue pages include directions for when the woodblock should be played and at what tempo, as well as when to play the CD.
- The entire musical may be accompanied live, with piano (the piano/vocal scores are provided as data files on the Enhanced CD) and/or Orff instruments.
- Finally, you can mix and match any of these options to create the performance that works best for you and your students! You could use the CD accompaniment on the *Damsselfly Can-Can*, for example, use the Orff Accompaniment for *Working Song*, and piano for the rest.

Just as you would expect from the powerhouse team of Sharon Burch and Mark Burrows, this musical is engaging, informative, hip, and helpful. The two-page Staging and Performance Suggestions that start on page 6 provide all the information you need to get started, and don’t miss the myriad of good stuff in the Production Guide or the reproducibles on the Enhanced CD.



STAGING AND PERFORMANCE SUGGESTIONS

HERE ON TREBLE CLEF ISLAND

Our musical begins on Treble Clef Island, home to Freddie the Frog®, Eli the Elephant, and their many friends. In the opening scene, Freddie and Eli are resting in the azalea bushes by the riverbank of Crocodile River. The waterfall pouring into the river is behind them, as are the bluff and the entrance to the mine. All the other critters are inside the copper and zinc mine, which is where they make brass instruments.

This opening song introduces the characters and the scene. As the song's introduction begins, the Red Brass Army Ants lead the line, keeping step with the music as they go to their places on stage. Blue Beetle Bugs and Damsel­flies follow, stopping at their places on stage as they sing. As each character is introduced in the song, the other characters “point” with two hands (fingers together) toward the character being sung about, “Vanna” style. The character being sung about does an appropriate action, such as Damsel­flies fluttering their palms and wings while doing a slight curtsy. Eli and Freddie can do a short handclap pattern when they are featured, and the Blue Beetle Bugs can do a “cool” move. The Red Brass Army Ants can march very militaristically when the cast points to them—higher knees and straight backs with elbows bent. At the end of the song, all can join hands with their like characters (so Damsel­flies with Damsel­flies, Ants with Ants, etc.) on the phrase, “we all live as one,” and then lift hands on the last phrase.

At the end of the song, all characters except Freddie and Eli freeze in place to demonstrate that they are in a different location than Freddie and Eli. At the end of Freddie and Eli's dialogue, Freddie and Eli sit down beside an azalea bush and fall asleep. The waterfall is removed, revealing the Mighty Meter Gnome and indicating that the action has now moved inside the mine. Other characters “un-freeze” at the start of *Working Song*.

WORKING SONG

This scene shows a typical day of work inside the copper and zinc mine. All movements should be very repetitive and mechanical (like robots on an assembly line) and to the steady beat played by the Mighty Meter Gnome. The Ants play follow-the-leader in a long narrow oval, moving across and around the stage. The Ants pantomime striking the mine walls with pick axes and picking up nuggets of copper and zinc. They hand their nugget to a blue beetle on stage right, who then hands it to the next beetle, who drops it into the smelting pot. The other two beetles stir the pot with oversized wooden spoons.

The damsel­fly standing next to the blue beetle uses long tongs to reach into the smelting pot and pull out a sheet of brass (aluminum foil spray-painted a brass color). She hands it to the next damsel­fly wearing oven mitts, who lays it on the table for the other two Damsel­flies to roll out with wooden rolling pins. It works well to choreograph and perform these actions over four beats. Again, all movements should be very robotic.

At the end of the song, everyone is exhausted at the end of a long day of work, but the Ants' feet are still moving to the beat, unable to stop, because the Mighty Meter Gnome is still ticking.

DAMSELFLY CAN-CAN

The Damsel­flies are the first friends to try and fix the Mighty Meter Gnome. Their dainty muscles try to move the weight up, but instead it goes down and causes the tempo to increase to *presto*. They try to move it back up, but give up in exasperation. The four Damsel­flies move to center stage and sing the song.

For a fun visual effect, have the four Blue Beetle Bugs form a line behind the Damsel­flies. They should stick their heads through the “windows” between each damsel­fly and sing “Someone help us!” then step back while the Damsel­flies sing the next line.

DIALOGUE 1

Treble Clef Island. Freddie and Eli are resting in the azalea bushes by the bank of Crocodile River talking. Behind them is the bluff and entrance to the copper and zinc mine, which is near the waterfall pouring into Crocodile River. (See page 68 for more information about creating the set.)
